Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The following is my Annual Report for 2008 given during the service on Jan. 18<sup>th</sup>, 2009. I promised a hard copy, and here it is. Just a quick reminder before you dive in, Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday are coming up fast. Shrove Tuesday is Feb. 24<sup>th</sup>, and there will be a Pancake Supper fund raiser for the kids going to Mexico on Breakout. Ash Wednesday, is of course, the following day, Feb. 25<sup>th</sup>. Now begins my Annual Report.

As has been my custom for over ten years now, my annual report is also my sermon. I do this because the meeting has already begun when we processed into church and this service started. Actually, it's very Trinitarian, as there are three parts to this day. There's our worship and prayer together. There's our fellowship and sharing a meal together. Then there's our business. Hopefully the first two parts help to set the tone for the third. And actually, this year, I'm going to hold off on the dismissal until we conclude our business, just to emphasize the importance of how the three parts of this day are intertwined into one whole.

This has been my first full year with you as your Interim Rector. Last year I had only been here five months when I had to get up and do this, so I'm happy to report that there was a lot less anxiety surrounding my preparation this year.

As in any year in any church, there's been the good, the not so good, and the bad. Overall, I think the good outweighs the bad, but you still have to look at all of it to get a true picture.

So let's start with the good. We're still here, we're still worshipping, we're still praying, we're still blessed in more ways than we can count. I fear that sometimes we don't notice the blessings that we receive and have, but they are there none the less.

In an intentional effort, the Vestry worked at trying to rebuild the sense of family and community that was such a hallmark of this parish. One of those efforts was having three combined services during the summer and

two or three more when the opportunity arose during the year, such as All Saints Sunday last November and this morning. Personally, I truly enjoy these services. I love looking out and seeing a full church. Nothing quite compares to that. I also love the full and vibrant voices praising God in the prayers and the music. Not that we don't get that at other times in both services, but there's something special when the full community comes together like this. And, I have to admit, I'm always up for a good meal!

Day after day, I'm always amazed at God's goodness and the blessings he has bestowed upon this family. All of you are a blessing, to me, to each other, to the church. Although maybe sometimes a little less so than at other times, but we all have our moments. We are blessed with this beautiful building. We are blessed with wonderful musicians who share their talents. We are blessed with numerous ministries that I'm not going to list because it would take too long. We are blessed with people dedicated to the life, work, and ministry of following our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

But despite all these blessings, we still have our troubles and challenges, just as any family or church has. We did lose some members over the last year. It's not surprising, but it's still hard. Some were more active than others, but that's not really the issue. The fact is that it is hard to lose any member. What we need to remember is that God is at work in that somewhere. We may not understand it, and we may never know the reasons why, but we must continue to pray for them and hope that they are following the path that our Lord wants them to follow.

We have come together more as a family over the past year, but there are still issues that can divide us if we let them. The actions of the National Church and events elsewhere in the Communion are a constant distraction and easily become all consuming. Yes, those actions and events affect us, and often it seems as if everything is spiraling out of control. The reality, though, is that we do have control. We control how those actions and events, statements and divisions, affect us here. We can let forces from outside come in and divide us, or we can take control, manage those forces, and continue the true work and ministry of St. Paul's. I'm not saying that we ignore those forces, but that we don't let them take over.

How do we do that? First and foremost, we keep our focus on God and our Savior Jesus Christ. That is number one. And you all know what can happen when you do that. Just look around. Second, we have the forum discussion group on the third Tuesday of the month. The last couple of meetings we had were really good, and they provide a safe environment for candid discussion of issues facing us as a congregation, the national church, and the communion. Third, when we have bible studies, prayer book classes, programs, small groups, those are times for spiritual growth, learning, fellowship, nurturing, and deepening our relationships with each other and with our Lord. Use them for that. Those times are precious and valuable beyond measure, and so incredibly important in the life and work of a church. Don't let the

politics and debates of the national church and the communion poison those times and take them over. The loss would be too great.

The coming year is actually a rather exciting one. Yes, there will be more news and events in the National Church for us to discuss, but as I said, we need to control how we deal with those things and not let them take over. The economy and the loss of jobs affect us all, but that's also an opportunity for new ministries and outreach. Finding new ways to reach out to our community and minister to those in need. Finding new ways to "know Jesus Christ and to share His love."

The Search Committee is hard at work trying to find "that one person whom God has called to serve His people in this place." It's not an easy task, so pray for them every day, because they need your help and your support.

And finally, I want to thank all of you for your hard work and your support over the past year. There were ups and downs, but we worshiped together, prayed together, worked together, served together, and through the Grace of God, we are still here doing those very same things together. Last year I said that I wanted to be able to stand here and see God's kingdom on earth. We are the Body of Christ. We are a reflection of God's Kingdom on this earth. It may be a bit fuzzy and dark at times, but the light continues to shine through the darkness, and the Holy Spirit continues to lead us.

But the only way to keep that darkness at bay though, is to intentionally keep our focus on Jesus. And to do this, we must do what all Christians everywhere must do. We must repent, we must forgive, we must love, and we must rejoice. Rejoice in the fellowship we have with each other and our Lord. Rejoice in the blessings He has bestowed upon us. Rejoice in the love that he so freely gives to us, rejoice in our love for Him, and rejoice in our love for each other. As Saint Paul himself wrote, "Rejoice in the Lord always, again I will say rejoice."

Jesus is Lord! All the time!

## ADULT BIBLE STUDY

I wanted to share with you some of the things we talk about on Sunday mornings in class. I am always amazed at the lively and thought-provoking discussions that take place! We learned that the Fruit of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control) are virtues that benefit both believers and unbelievers. They are given to us by the Holy Spirit, not just by trying to discipline ourselves or keep the letter of the Law.

Did you know that the Bible talks about fruit alot? We find it in the Old Testament 106 times and in the New Testament 70 times. Jesus Himself talked much about the fruit of the spirit and of bearing fruit. John 15 speaks plainly of our relationship to Jesus and in Matthew 7:15-20, Jesus says we will be recognized by our fruit. How does that saying go---"They will know we are Christians by our love (fruit)?"

As we yield to the Holy Spirit, these virtues will enter our lives, and that is important because:

1. It is pleasing to God
2. They benefit others
3. They are a sign of Christ in us
4. They are used for discernment - a kind of measuring stick

One Bible scholar put it this way: "I am not to judge you, but I am a fruit inspector, and I have a right to look at the fruit you are producing." What kind of fruit are we producing in our lives? And as we think about that, we never really know what kind of fruit we are bearing until it gets squeezed! Come Holy Spirit . . .

## KITCHEN EQUIPMENT

We encourage all parishioners to familiarize themselves with the kitchen. You will find some truly superb equipment there. Whether you are hosting a coffee hour, a Lenten Supper or just being a helper in the kitchen, the more you know, the more confident and competent you will feel when working there. Instruction manuals are in a notebook on the counter next to the coffee pots. . Another resource is our kitchen expert, Karen Solimar. She will instruct or guide anyone willing to spend a little time learning. Others are willing to pass on what they know. You will probably get by one way or the other, but really, do become informed. You are welcome to ask for someone to work with you the first few times you are serving coffee.

We have a dishwasher like the one you probably have at home. It is located across from the refrigerator. Dishwasher soap is under the sink, just like at home. The other "dishwasher" is a **DISH SANITIZER**. It is located across from the coffee pots. The important thing to remember about the sanitizer is that dishes must be scraped and rinsed IN HOT SOAPY WATER before putting them into the racks. For instance if there is lipstick on the cups or glasses, the sanitizer will not remove it. The following article, written by Karen, will be a good reminder for those who regularly use the sanitizer as well. Please read on:

### HOBART COMMERCIAL DISH SANITIZER

**The Hobart Commercial "Dishwasher" is really a Dish Sanitizer! What that means is that All dishes and flatware need to be scraped and rinsed in hot soapy water before "washing" them in the Hobart. There is no need to add soap or rinse additive. The Hobart does that automatically. If items do not appear clean, check to make sure the automatic dispensers (under kitchen sink across from coffee maker) have soap/rinse agents in them. Extra supplies are in the storeroom.**

Prior to using, check to make sure the two filters are clean. The large filter is on the inside bottom of the Hobart. There is a second smaller "basket" filter underneath the large filter.

At least ½ hour before using, push the "on" button and the Hobart will begin heating the water to be used. The water temperature should be about 180 F. for the dish sanitizer to work properly. Just before using, push the "wash" button and let one cycle go through without dishes in it. This ensures the temperature is hot enough. Load "prepared" dishes in the racks. (Be sure there is adequate space for water to flow between dishes.) Push the "wash" button. The sanitizer "washes" and "rinses" the dishes in about three minutes. After the "rinse" light goes out, you may remove the dishes onto a bath towel laid out on the counter. (Bath towels are in the bottom

drawer under the Tea Cupboard.) Let dishes air-dry. They are extremely hot and will dry quickly. The next load of dishes may be put in the sanitizer immediately after taking out the previous load. (No need to wait!) After all dishes have been sanitized, push the "Off" button. The Hobart will empty automatically. Open the door to let it cool. Then clean and rinse the large filter on the bottom of the Hobart. Lastly place a washcloth or dishtowel in the door of the Hobart to facilitate air movement. . . . Karen Solimar

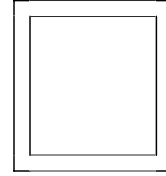
